
STREAM RESTORATION.....WHAT'S IT ALL ABOUT?

Stream restoration, or river restoration, also sometimes referred to as river reclamation, are improvements conducted to improve the environmental health of a river or stream, in support of biodiversity, recreation, flood management, and/or landscape development. An example of a stream restoration in Jackson Township can be found at Little Creek Community Park. There will be a continuation of the stream restoration across the road along Little Creek Road to the railroad tracks. The Township received grant funding to permit and construct the continuing stream restoration with construction to begin in late May/early June.

Stream restoration projects typically begin with an assessment of a local stream system, including climactic data, geology, watershed hydrology, stream hydraulics, sediment transport patterns, channel geometry, historic channel mobility, and flood records. This preliminary study helps to understand the stream dynamics and to determine the cause of the degradation.

There are two broad approaches to stream restoration that have been defined as form-based and process-based restoration. Form-based restoration focuses primarily on the restoration of structural features and/or patterns considered to be characteristic of the target stream system, versus process-based restoration which focuses on the restoration of



The stream restoration at Little Creek Community Park is an example of a form-based restoration. Form-based restoration promotes the modification of a stream channel to improve stream conditions. Targeted outcomes can include water quality, enhanced fish habitat and abundance, as well as increased bank and channel stability. In the case of the stream in Little Creek Park, the banks of the stream were pulled back and widened. The channel was seeded with rye grass and riparian plantings were included. The same process will be taking place this summer when the continuation of the stream restoration happens in the section of stream on the opposite side of the road.

Taking the trail and looking at the stream from the pedestrian bridges, one can already see the stream water quality has greatly improved. Fish are returning and waterfowl can be seen such as egrets, and blue heron. There is a nest of egrets at the stream. So, while taking the trail, take notice of the improvements and see what aquatic life can be found there. While the immediate landscape of the rye grass may make the stream look "unkempt" the naturalization of the stream is working as designed.






Spotted Lanternfly: What to Look For

Spotted Lanternfly, Lycorma delicatula, is a new threat to Pennsylvania and the United States, and experts are still learning how to combat it.



Life Stages of Spotted Lanternfly All life stages of the spotted lanternfly, from egg to adult.



Life Cycle of Spotted Lanternfly The life cycle of spotted lanternfly, beginning from egg to adult. There is one generation per year in Pennsylvania. Adults die in the winter, and the eggs overwinter and hatch in the spring.



Spotted Lanternfly Egg Masses - Fresh Freshly laid egg masses, which are about 1" long and laid on hard surfaces, including trees, stones, patio furniture, etc. The egg masses are covered in a white putty-like substance, which age over time to look like cracked mud. Image by Erica Smyers.

SPRING BRUSH CLEAN-UP PLANNED

We will be conducting a Spring Brush pickup to collect only tree and shrubbery trimmings throughout the township. The pickup is scheduled to begin Monday, May 10. All of your recyclable brush MUST be placed at the curb or road edge before 7 AM on Monday, May 10. The limbs, branches and trimmings should be on small piles in lengths no longer that 4 to 6 feet. ONLY 1 PILE PER PROPERTY. We will be starting on the eastern side of the township and working westward but THERE WILL ONLY BE ONE PASS MADE THROUGH THE TOWNSHIP.

NOTE: NO GRASS, LEAVES, TREE STUMPS, DIRT, STONES, LANDSCAPING MATERIALS, ORNAMENTAL GRASS BAMBOO OR BRANCHES OVER 6 INCHES IN DIAMETER WILL BE COLLECTED!

Residents who are late in placing their brush out for pick-up, may take it where we do to the H&H Mulch facility on Old Hanover Road any day from dawn till dusk providing you adhere to their policy as follows: ONLY ITEMS THAT NATURALLY GROW AS PART OF A TREE OR BUSH WILL BE ACCEPTED, otherwise you will be turned away.

BASIC RESIDENTIAL GUIDELINES



- Trash, Recycling, and one bulk item must be curb side by 6:00 AM on your scheduled collection day, which is Thursday.

- No more than 4 bags or containers will be collected per customer.
- · Low Volume Customers must attach a bag to a bulk item.

Amended Soils

What is it?

Much of the management of stormwater relies on soil that can infiltrate runoff. Disturbed soils that have been compacted through construction activities or soils with poor organic content can be restored and amended through loosening the soil and adding material like compost.


How does it work?

Little spaces between soil particles called pores or voids allow water to both be stored in the soil and move through the soil as infiltration. When the soil is compacted through the process of development, the pores or void spaces are reduced. Compaction of soil prevents water from infiltrating. Loosening the soil or tilling can reduce compaction and increase the soils ability to infiltrate runoff. Adding organic material like compost, sand, or manufactured soil media to the soil increases the pore spaces in the soil, which increases its ability to hold water.

How does a Homeowner maintain it?

Protection:

- The key to maintaining amended soils is to protect and preserve them.
- Compaction of the soil should be avoided. Don't use as an extra parking area or storage for a recreational vehicle.
- Amended soils that are a BMP can't be removed. For example, the area cannot to be converted to a patio or other use that would prevent stormwater infiltration.




There needs to be air spaces in between soil particles for water to be infiltrated.

Amended soils have increased air space, but these air spaces are lost if the soil is compacted by heavy equipment or vehicle parking.
